



Engaged Scholar Award

Award Criteria

The Engaged Scholar Award will recognise a scholar for exemplary critical community-engaged scholarship and her/his contribution to community psychology, as well as the development and enhancement of knowledge and education in these fields. As an engaged scholar, the nominee must demonstrate a body of academically relevant work that simultaneously advances scholarship in the field of community engagement and addresses critical societal issues.

Eligibility

Nominees will be evaluated on the basis of a dossier documenting exemplary publicly-engaged scholarship.

Nominees must have:

- Enriched scholarship through teaching and learning, research and development or enhancement of curriculum
- Exhibited leadership and prepared young scholars to aspire to be engaged citizens; and strengthened democratic values and civic responsibility
- Made a noteworthy contribution to the field of community psychology and community engaged research
- Secured grants for community engaged projects
- Contributed to policy and advocacy within continental, national and international academic and other public fora
- Contributed to critical academic scholarship
- Membership on editorial boards and/or institutions and community organisations

Assessment Criteria

The nominee's contribution to community psychology should be visible through excellent research, contributions to curriculum enhancement and development, refereed publications, contributions to positive community outcomes, success in securing research grants, and the national and international visibility of her/his profile and projects.

The nomination form below should be submitted with a letter of support detailing:

The nature of the nominee's work, specifying the contribution to psychology by:

- (a) Describing the important theoretical and empirical contributions and their impact on the field that are usually attributed to the nominee
- (b) Describing the nominee's scholarly agenda and how it includes community-based issues and practices, outlining how the nominee's community-engaged work enhances knowledge and scholarship, and how her/his scholarly work has contributed to or is likely to bring about positive societal changes
- (c) Comparing the nominee with others in her/his field

Additional Documents Required

Curriculum Vitae of the nominee; letters of support from at least two scholars familiar with the nominee's work; a list of the nominee's five most significant publications; and five reprints of the nominee's representative work (preferably in electronic format)
